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February 14, 1899: What's been called the "Great Eastern Blizzard of '99" inundates Washington, DC with 20.5 in., 52 cm. of snow and Cape May, NJ, with 34 in., or 86 cm. In Washington snow depth reaches 34 in., or 86 cm.; in Cape May, 41 in., or 104 mm. 1940: St. Valentine's Day blizzard in southern New England delivers whole gales and snow depths of 10 to 17 in., or 25 to 40 cm. In Boston, many are stranded following a Sonja Henie ice show.

March 1, 1980: Snow falls in Florida as Miami reports 32 F (0 C); at Norfolk, VA, 13.7 in. (35 cm.) falls, increasing the winter total to a record 41.9 in., or (106 cm). In 1914: Heavy snows and high winds hammer New York and New Jersey; 24 in., or (61 cm) of snow at Asbury Park, NJ; telephone and power lines down across the state.

Random Questions and/or Answers

lightning

Q. Can lightning strike up from the ground to a cloud?

A. This is a commonly asked question, to which the answer is both yes and no. Lightning, in it's simplest definition, is a discharge of electricity, which occurs in mature

thunderstorms. Although we might expect lightning to come down from the clouds like the rain does, lightning actually occurs dynamically between the thunderstorm and the ground. Approximately one out of five lightning "strokes" actually hits the ground. These are referred to as cloud-to-ground strikes. The complete lightning strike process is a series of steps, all of which happens in a few millionths of a second and thus appears as one motion to the human eye.

The lightning process begins with the bottom side of the cumulonimbus cloud, or thunderstorm, becoming negatively charged with electricity. Since unlike charges attract, this causes the ground beneath the thunderstorm to become positively charged. This positive charge on the ground is most pronounced in objects extending above the ground, such as tall trees or buildings. The negative charge in the base of the thunderstorm continues to grow until a series of very faint and small strikes, called "stepped leaders", strikes in succession, each extending approximately 50 meters lower than the previous. As the stepped leaders near the ground, a current of positive charge starts up to meet it (again, this is usually from an object extending above ground). When the two meet, a flood of the negatively charged electrons flows into the ground, followed immediately by a positive charge rushing back up the path of the stepped leaders into the cloud. This is called the "return stroke" and is a much larger and brighter stroke than the proceeding stepped leaders, and this is what we actually see. Again, all this happens virtually simultaneously and just appears as a quick bolt of lightning to us. Thus, lightning starts from the clouds, but it is the return stroke from the ground that we see.
